# FIRST FOREIGN-BORN MAYOR FIFCTED WINS AS INDEP

State Senator Scores Early Knockout Over G. O. P.'s McDermott; Maintains Democratic Control Over City Hall; Cosmopolitan Areas Solidly Behind Victor

Board of Election returns early today from 1,054 of the 1,089 voting places gave:

ANTHONY J. CELEBREZZE (I. D.) 136,475 WILLIAM J. McDERMOTT (R.)... 91,228

This would give Celebrezze a projected majority of 46,739 votes and an indicated percentage of approximately 60%.

On a perfect day for balloting, it appeared that around 235,000 out of the city's 404,000 eligible voters had gone to the polls.

Anthony J. Celebrezze, ruggedly independent Democrat, became the first foreign-born citizen to be elected mayor of Cleveland yesterday as the cosmopolitan wards gave him a tremendous majority over Republican William J. McDermott.

Only about six of every 10 eligible voters in this Democratic stronghold balloted on an ideal autumn day, but the 43-year-old state senator rushed to such a commanding early lead that he virtually scored a first-round technical knockout over the former juvenile court judge.

McDermott conceded defeat graciously just before 10 p. m., only three and a half hours after the polls closed. Republican County Chairman George H. Bender had trrown in the towel at 9 o'clock.
