

Breaking Ground at

E. 9th St. and Lakeside Avenue

On Good Friday, April 19, 1957, 37-year-old Charles E. Scripps, a grandson of Press founder E. W. Scripps, turned the first shovel of dirt for the new \$10 million Press headquarters at E. Ninth St. and Lakeside Avenue. Scripps told the gathering, "Today, because The Press has thrived on the confidence and esteem of the people of this great community, and because of the people's faith in the journalistic principles of the Scripps-Howard Newspapers, we have outgrown our old building further up E. Ninth St. and now embark upon this new and larger building venture overlooking the most precious physi-














UNDER CONSTRUCTION Dec. 17, 1957

As work progressed on its new four-story headquarters at left, The Press noted on Thursday, December 17, 1957, "A dream is coming true at E. Ninth St. and Lakeside Ave.the dream of "The Newspaper That Serves Its Readers."" Expected to be completed by late 1958, the new facility doubled the size of the paper's former home.
